

**THE GOOD MOVIE CLUB:
A CINEMA PROGRAM
DESIGNED TO ENHANCE LEARNING AND ADVANCE TEACHING**

Good movies, like good books, teach us something worth remembering. It may originate in a complex plot, or a well drawn character, or a sequence of stunning and startling images projected indelibly on the screen. No matter where it may emanate from, good movies, again like good books, offer us truths about our pasts, our futures and ourselves which we as educators can incorporate into the way we think about our students and approach the challenge of educating them.

Through the auspices of this program you will be given the opportunity to not only view good movies but to contemplate how they might serve the goals and objectives you have established for students in your classroom. It will be up to you to decide how and why a particular movie might advance your professional interests in the classroom. The movies you choose for consideration were not created to serve the needs of teachers working with students. It will be up to you to make the creative application from movie theater to school classroom. That should not prove hard for you to do. Making creative applications to the classroom from the larger world outside is what good teachers do all the time.

All the movies chosen for the movie lists found below are readily available on dvd for purchase from retail outlets or rental from various online services. Your challenge will not come from gaining access to a particular dvd but from deciding before or after viewing whether a particular dvd is suitable for use in this program. Since you will be asked to answer specific questions [explained in detail below] about the movies you have selected in order to complete the work required from you in this program, it might be a good idea to rent or borrow rather than purchase any DVDs you select for consideration. That way you minimize your costs or expenditures in the event a particular movie selected by you for consideration proves to be a poor fit for the purposes and parameters of this program.

Before selecting a specific movie for viewing from the list below, it might be a good to answer a few preliminary questions that I have provided for your consideration. Answering these questions will help you make movie selections which best fit your particular professional needs and classroom situation.

1. Does the movie under consideration deal with plots, themes or characters which might have relevance for your work in education ?
2. How did you come to consider the movie ? Did you read about it? Have it recommended to you? Learn about it from some other source?
3. Do you think that the movie has enough preliminary promise to warrant your investing time in viewing it ?

4. Is there a sufficient basis to believe, based on what you know about the movie, that you will be able to make a creative application of the movie's content to the particulars of your students and classroom ?
5. Can you think of other movies that you have watched over the years which could have been used to answer the questions posed in this program [if you scroll down several pages you will find those questions listed under the heading THREE STANDARD QUESTIONS].

There are three movie lists for you to choose from. The first is titled A SELECTED LIST OF MOVIES YOU MUST SEE BEFORE YOU DIE and is an amalgam of movie titles found on either TIME MAGAZINE'S ALL TIME 100 MOVIES or NET FLIX'S 1001 MOVIES YOU MUST SEE BEFORE YOU DIE.

The second is titled CLASSIC MOVIES FOR THE AGES and was assembled by my oldest daughter, Lauren Wissot, a film critic in New York City for several online media services.

The third is titled THE BEST EDUCATION MOVIES EVER MADE and was created by my youngest daughter, Jordana Wissot, a special education teacher at the United Nations International School in New York City who has extensively employed film in her classroom for the past ten years. Look the lists over carefully. Make your selections. And most important of all: enjoy the experience.

PROCEDURES FOR PETITIONING FOR A MOVIE SELECTION NOT FOUND ON ANY OF THE THREE ABOVE LISTS

If there is a movie title that you would like to use that is not found on any of the three above lists, please contact me, Jay Wissot, by either phone [303-393-1622] or e-mail [jayhwissot@mac.com]. In general if a petitioned movie has some substantive merits that does relate to education I will in all likelihood approve it. I am only likely to decline the use of a movie whose only value is entertainment.

PROCEDURES FOR SUBMITTING REQUIRED WORK ASSIGNMENTS

1. It is possible to earn up to SIX hours of graduate level credit by viewing movies and writing a response to THREE STANDARD QUESTIONS [listed below] for each movie viewed. In order to earn ONE hour of graduate level credit you would have to view ONE movie and submit your response to the three standard questions; in order to earn TWO hours of graduate level credit you would have to view TWO movies and submit a response to the three standard questions for EACH movie; in order to earn THREE hours of graduate credit you would have to view THREE movies and submit a response to the three standard questions for all THREE movies.
2. Once you have completed your required work assignments, please go to our website[www.aboutteachers.com] and download the necessary UCD registration forms and, if you wish to pay by that method, credit card slips. We accept MC and Visa. Please make checks payable to: Colorado Consulting Services. Tuition is \$140.00 per credit hour.

1. Please put the title, CINEMA FOR EDUCATORS, on your UCD registration form if you wish to earn ONE HOUR OF GRADUATE LEVEL CREDIT.
2. Please put the title, MOVIES THAT MATTER FOR EDUCATION, on your UCD registration form if you wish to earn TWO HOURS OF GRADUATE LEVEL CREDIT.
3. Please put the title, CRITICAL ISSUES IN CINEMA FOR THE CLASSROOM, on your UCD registration form if you wish to earn THREE HOURS OF GRADUATE LEVEL CREDIT.

Please remember that course titles can be taken ONLY ONCE and that a maximum of SIX semester hours of graduate level credit can be earned in the program.

2. What happens in the movie either good or bad to one or more of the characters that would provide teachable moments for you and perhaps life lessons for your students ?
3. What questions in the movie were left unanswered ? What issues were left unresolved ? What needs did you have which the movie failed to satisfy?
